CITRUS GROWERS INSTITUTE

The Citrus Growers' Institute will be held September 16 and 17 at the Bartow Civic Center beginning each morning at 9:00 AM.

Nineteen eighty-one has been an eventful year with the severe freeze of January followed by a prolonged drought. This is typical of natural disasters common to those in citrus production in Florida and agriculture worldwide. Such extremes in weather conditions usually result in financial hardships for some, substantial profits for others, and frequently changes in the world market situation. Many observations were made during and following the freeze and ensuing drought for which we have no acceptable explanations—an indication of our lack of understanding of certain basic aspects of citrus tree behavior. While we are all in agreement that the long dormancy period prior to the freeze precluded more extensive tree damage, the relative cold tolerance of certain scion/rootstock combinations was not always as expected. The drought has served to remind us that, even in Florida, water is a finite resource and that our irrigation habits and methods will most certainly have to change.

While many meetings we attend each year may not provide all the answers we need, they do serve as a forum for discussion during which new ideas are generated and shared. The Institutes and Seminars directed by the Fruit Crops Department have for many years served as such a forum. We, once again, invite all those with a common interest in citrus to attend and contribute to the continued success of these educational functions.
